
- Any size you like. Concrete pools can be built to any size, shape and depth.

- High initial cost. Concrete pools require more construction and material costs than other inground pools, including square footage, interior finish, patio and water features.
- **High lifetime ownership cost.** Concrete pools also require more chemical and equipment use during their lifetime, leaving owners with higher operating costs.
- **Slow installation time.** Build time can take up to two months, leaving you with a longer window before you can enjoy your time in the water.

Finish Options Include: standard plaster, aggregate (glass bead, pebble or quartz), and tile (porcelain, stone or glass).

- Non-abrasive finish. Vinyl material is smooth and soft to the touch.






POINTS OF CONSIDERATION

- **Some design limitations.** The shapes available for vinyl liner pool construction are somewhat limited.

Vanishing Edge, Infinity or Negative Edge Pools





Automated swimming pool systems have experienced rapid growth in recent years, allowing today's pool owners more flexibility when it comes to operating and controlling your pool. Some of the energy-efficient equipment available today includes, but is not limited to, the following:

Variable-Speed Pumps: Almost all brand new pools today are built with a variable-speed pump. As the name suggests, these pumps can be run at variable speeds, and pool owners can program the pump to run at selected speeds during certain times of the day and night to maximize energy efficiency.

In-Floor Cleaning Systems: An automatic in-floor pool cleaning system is built with low-profile fixtures which will automatically pop up and push any debris down to the drain where it will then be whisked out of the pool. Select systems also feature an automated cleaner or sweeper that travels around and cleans your pool.

Water Levelers: These automatic water fillers are designed to prevent poor filtration issues and potential expensive damage. With the help of sensor probes to monitor the water level, they prevent pool water from overflowing or depleting.



Pool Automation Systems: Automation systems do as they say by automating all functions of the pool's operating and maintenance systems, including sanitization, cleaning, filtration and balancing pH. Most importantly, by automating your pool, you can save up to 70 percent on your pool's operating costs.

Sanitizers: Sanitizers are used to kill bacteria and inhibit the growth of algae, virus and other contaminants that enter the pool water. Sanitizing options include salt chlorine generators, ozone generators and UV sanitizers.

Heat Pumps: Heat pumps use electricity to capture heat and move it from one place to another. While there is a larger initial investment than a gas heater, they have a lower annual operating cost due to their highly efficient nature. These are wonderful additions to pools where the outside temperature remains above 45 to 50 degrees.

A pool is more than just a hole in the ground, and in order to create the perfect space, you need to consider your tile and coping options, decking options, fire and water features and interior finishes.


